PLANT NOW

THE SWEETEST PEAS

Usher in spring with the season's earliest (and best-smelling) flower. By Johanna Silver

> Erin Benzakein on her flower farm in Washington State





ne of Erin Benzakein's earliest childhood chores was snipping sweet peas out of her great-grandparents' garden in Walla Walla, Washington, to put in vases. Now a flower farmer and floral designer in Washington's Skagit Valley, she does the exact same work, with dialed-up hours (sunup to sundown) and on a larger patch of land (2 planted-to-the-brim acres). Of the 170 types of flowers she cultivates on her farm, Floret Flowers (*floretflowers.com*), sweet peas are still prized. "Every year,

I think I've grown them all, but I always find dozens more," says Benzakein, who works directly with breeders in England and New Zealand to grow sweet peas with longer stems, more weather-resistant blooms, and unusual hues. "There are some crazy psychedelic colors that are coming out right now," she adds. Here, Benzakein offers her favorite varieties of the fragrant cool-season flowers, plus tips for growing success.

GROWING TIPS

SOW SEEDS

Soak sweet-pea seeds for 12 to 24 hours before sowing into 4-inch pots. This softens the outer shell and speeds up germination from two weeks to five to seven days.

PREP SOIL

While waiting for seeds to sprout, prepare growing beds. Benzakein adds a 2- to 4-inch layer of compost into any bed but gives sweet peas a boost: "I run a 12-inch-deep trench down the center of the bed and fill it with compost so once the sweet peas send roots down, there's a feast awaiting them below."

MAKE TRELLISES

Drive wood or metal posts roughly 8 feet apart and attach chicken wire for the flowers to climb.

SET IRRIGATION

Run soaker hoses alongside the seedlings. "Without the hoses, keeping their thirst quenched in warm weather can be a full-time chore," she says.

PLANT

Set out seedlings around the time of the last frost in two rows, one on either side of the trellis, roughly 8 inches apart.

FEED & MAINTAIN

Feed a weekly dose of fish emulsion and kelp, stopping once the vines explode into lush growth. To ensure straight stems, secure plants to the trellis with twine weekly.

HARVEST

Every other morning, pick stems that have at least 2 unopened flowers at the tip. "The more you harvest, the more they flower," she says.

ON THEIR OWN

Left: Sweet peas come in a wild spectrum of colors, from blues to reds, as seen in this arrangement of 'Eclipse', 'Ethel Grace', 'Joyce Stanton', 'Nimbus', 'North Shore', and 'Our Harry'. The flowers have the strongest fragrance and longest vase life if they're harvested early in the morning, before temperatures heat up.

FAVORITE VARIETIES

Of the 100-plus sweet peas Benzakein has trialed, these are some of her top picks.

'CHARLIE'S ANGEL'

Blossoms make this variety one of the most popular on the show benches in England.

'JILLY'

Blooms are the loveliest shade of cream, making this a multiaward-winning choice.

'MOLLIE RILSTONE'

Creamy, blush-tinted blooms that have a strong fruity scent atop long, tall stems.

'NIMBUS'

The inky gray petals with eggplant purple stripes win for uniqueness.

'RESTORMEL'

Scarlet-cerise petals of this largeflowered variety are excellent for cutting and highly fragrant.

VALERIE HARROD'

Petals are a brilliant glowing orangepink, resembling unripe watermelon.
